Meeting Minutes City Hall – Room 208 April 2, 2003 www.nashua-coc.org

- 1. Call to Order: 8:05 a.m. by Chairperson Lisa Christie.
- 2. All present introduced themselves.
- 3. <u>Minutes of Previous Meetings:</u> T. Epaphras moved to accept March's minutes; P. Kelleher seconded; the motion was approved. K. Nijhuis moved to accept February's minutes; Bob Mack seconded; the motion was approved.
- 4. Report from Mayor's Task Force: D. Lozeau reported that the group continued to meet monthly. Three current sub-committees were wrapping up tasks. The Existing Policies sub-committee made a formal presentation at the last full task force meeting. The full task force will now divide into two new sub-committees, Public and Private. The point is to review issues as they impact private and public housing developers. Theses two sub-committees will meet on the last Wednesday of each month in April and May and the Full Task Force would meet again the last Wednesday in June. They have received a copy of the Manchester Housing task force and Nashua's report will try and be produced with recommendations instead of a summary of facts. Some of the Task Force members also participate in a statewide group. The statewide group put together a group of members and four business owners representing the four geographical areas of the state and had a productive meeting with the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House. The focus of the meeting was not on specific legislation, but focused on the economic impact of the lack of housing.
- 5. Collaborative Initiative to Help End Chronic Homelessness: P. Kelleher reported that this CoC, in concert with the two other CoCs in the state, is the only applicant from New Hampshire working on a proposal. The proposal would be to find 60 apartments for the homeless (about 20 in each CoC area in the state) to be used in partnership with the various healthcare service and housing agencies, and veterans. (Of the 60, 36 would be for the chronically homeless: veterans, substance abusers, and mentally ill clients. The other 24 could be used for any homeless people.) The HUD part of the funds need to have a cash match; none would be required on the rest, which all together amounts to about \$3.5 million over three years. Here in Nashua, Harbor Homes would provide the apartments while Keystone Hall and the Nashua Area Health Center would provide the services. The prime focus of tenants for the apartments will be on veterans. D. Lozeau expressed concerns relative to the importance of partnerships surrounding housing initiatives. She related strong feelings that perhaps the community always benefits when we partner with each other based on agency strengths. P. Kelleher explained that Harbor Homes does housing already. Harbor Homes pursued additional mainstream Section 8 Certificates that were available through

lottery. Subsequent to approval of Harbor Homes' application, the Nashua Housing Authority worked collaboratively to implement the mainstream proposal. L. Christie remarked that recently a homeless veteran was found dead in Nashua who could have benefited from such a program. P. Kelleher asked for the CoC's written statement of support for this proposal. K. Nijhuis moved that we sign this and also use this as an opportunity to begin implementing a formal evaluation process of CoC projects undertaken. D. Lozeau seconded and the motion was approved.

- 6. Public Hearing Amending City's Consolidated Plan: (handouts) K. Nijhuis reported that the City of Nashua is becoming a direct recipient HOME funds and the amount of the award is about \$583K based, in part, on the results of the last census. A public notice of today's meeting was published in the Telegraph stating there would be a public hearing to receive input to the proposed amendment to the 2000-2005 Consolidated Plan to incorporate HUD HOME funds, as a direct recipient, into the Plan. He explained that of this money, 10% would go toward administration costs, 15% to CHDO projects with another 5% for their administration costs. He also mentioned that this is through the combined CDBG/HOME award process. The Aldermen, in order to fund more CDBG project applications, shifted some CDBG requests to HOME.
- 7. <u>Conference to End Homelessness:</u> P. Kelleher announced that he now has the brochures/registration for the May 2, 2003 conference to be held at the Crown Plaza Hotel. The committee is busy planning the conference and will be meeting each week.
- 8. Other Agenda Items: Will be taken up at the next meeting due to lack of time.

9. Other:

- a. C. Carberry reminded everyone of the April 17th Public Hearing and Comment Session about Land Use. K. Nijhuis mentioned the Human Affairs Meeting on April 16th also, which is to discuss how the CDBG and HOME funds will be allocated. Both meetings will be in City Hall at 7:00 PM. K. Nijhuis and D. Lozeau noted that this will be good opportunity to get involved, make our concerns heard, and not let any legislation be finalized until all issues have been examined.
- b. L. Christie announced that the Nashua Legal Aid Office has now been approved by the State legislature. Also, the annual Soup Kitchen and Shelter's race is April 6th.
- c. B. Marks announced the meeting date of the Greater Nashua Interfaith Hospitality Network has been changed to the fourth Thursday of every month at Christ the King Lutheran Church, Broad Street, 7:15 PM.
- 10. Next Meeting: May 7, 2003, 8:00 to 9:00 am, Room 208 at Nashua City Hall.
- 11. Adjournment: The meeting adjourned at 9:15 am.
