## What is the Current System?

Are we forced to live within the system? What needs to change?

What choices do we have within the system?

## **Chronic vs. Acute Homelessness**

Packet of statistics and disclaimers (and theory)

Point of view: statistics on State – with Nashua as a subset

By discussing the nature of the problem (the possible reasons/explanations) we might end up focusing on the past rather than the future. We need to focus on solutions.

Visual representation of homelessness in form of candies, flowers, mirrors that represent:

Total number of homeless or

% of the population that are homeless

Toot our own horn and celebrate our successes

Case studies

What about apathy in the community: Other people will take care of it Over committed volunteers Collaboration of individuals, agencies, market, government, and volunteer associations (civil society)

"We've been band-aiding" here is a permanent solution

Band-aid solutions don't work when you are hemorrhaging

**HUD Funding:** Emergency Shelter Grant (old)

**Permanent Supportive Housing (new)** 

Define who constitutes the current homeless vs. the pre- 1970's

Act like a community

Also address substandard housing

Problem of the moving definition of what is substandard We are in trouble with poverty – how poverty is interrelated with homelessness

Are we going to Reduce or End homelessness

Are we using a strategy of Overreaching, where we say we are going to end, but will settle for reduction of homelessness?

Need a solution that prevents them from becoming homeless

A new homeless population – unemployment, displacement The recent – de-institutionalized The Old – Those that choose to be "vagabonds"

What is the purpose of the panel discussion?

Things coming from grassroots vs. CoC process driven by HUD funding Goal: A convener(s) emerges for each of the three CoCs

That convener might be an individual or an established, legitimated agency (Coalition to End Homelessness or CoC subcommittee If it is CoC – we will need to ensure a process to bring in all stakeholders, not just CoC members

Help those who don't want to be homeless

**Create permanent housing** 

**Build infrastructure** 

To move people to empowerment

To provide supports for those who can't

Eliminate those things that encourage dependency

Open up capacity in the existing safety net to address crisis situations

Have a sense of direction
